THE SEED

Look At The Book Genesis 1:26-32

INTRODUCTION

- A. Family feuds make great stories.
 - 1. Shakespeare in Romeo and Juliet the Montagues and Capulets, sworn enemies.
 - 2. The Hatfields and McCoys the "stuff of which legends are made."
- B. Genesis, a drama built around two feuding families.
 - 1. The major story of Genesis
 - a. A growing separation between two groups of people.
 - b. Two families with very different values and goals.
 - 2. Originally, only one family with one Father.
 - a. God created Adam and Eve (Gen. 1 and 2).
 - b. His intent seems to have been to raise through them a family who would honor and worship Him.
 - 3. Chapter 3 tells of a split occurring two family lines established:
 - a. The family of God who honor God and live according to commands.
 - b. The family of Satan rejected God and refuse to be governed by commands.
 - 4. These two families are sworn enemies, waging battle in which only one side can be victorious; the losing side doomed to extinction.

I. EMPHASIS ON FAMILY.

- A. God Begins a Family.
 - 1. Adam and Eve in the image of their Father, Gen. 1:27.
 - a. Adam had a son "in his image", Gen. 5:3.
 - b. Adam is called the "son of God", Luke 3:38.
 - 2. Adam and Eve, the children of God.
- B. "Be Fruitful and Multiply".
 - 1. God's command to "be fruitful and multiply", Gen. 1:22.
 - 2. Examples of those receiving the command/promise:
 - a. Adam and Eve, 1:28.
- b. Noah, 9:1.
- c. Abraham never commanded, but promised 7 times!
- d. Isaac, 26:4.

- e. Jacob, 28:14; 35:11.
- C. Satan is a "father" himself, raising sons and daughters in his likeness.

II. THE FEUD BEGINS.

- A. Good Seed Bad Seed.
 - 1. In the garden, one big happy family (Gen. 1-2).
 - a. God has open fellowship with His children.
 - b. He provides for their needs; they honor and worship Him.
 - 2. With the fall, a new family is born (Gen. 3).
 - a. Two families: Righteous and Unrighteous; Obedient and Disobedient.
 - b. No longer one Father, but two (God and Satan).
 - 3. The foreshadowing, Gen. 3:15.
 - a. The feud enmity between woman and serpent.
 - b. Both would have offspring:
 - i. The woman and her offspring stand for what God would continue to do through His family.
 - ii. The serpent would raise a family that would feud with God's family.

- B. Early Developments in the Family Feud.
 - 1. Cain, Abel, and Seth.
 - a. The two "seeds", Gen. 4.
 - i. Abel is "righteous" in God's eyes, Gen. 4:4; Heb. 11:4.
 - ii. Cain is "unrighteous" by his actions, Satan's seed, Gen. 4:5.
 - iii. Enmity between them Cain kills Abel.
 - b. Cain flees and begins a family of his own belonging to Satan's seed.
 - c. The righteous seed of God carried on through Seth.
 - And "then men began to call on the name of the Lord", Gen. 4:26.
 - 2. Sons of God and Daughters of Men.
 - a. Genesis 6:1-6.
 - i. The "sons of God" God's family line.
 - ii. The "daughters of men" Satan's family line.
 - b. Satan's seed seems to overwhelm God's seed.
 - i. The whole earth has become wicked, 6:5-6.
 - ii. Only Noah was "righteous, Gen. 6:8-9.
 - iii. Only he could carry on God's line of righteous people.
 - iv. The flood was an attempt to start over again.
 - 3. Noah's sons: Shem, Ham, and Japheth, Gen. 9 and 10.
 - a. A fresh beginning, "Be fruitful and multiply", 9:1.
 - b. A fresh separation. But once again Satan's seed is introduced.
 - c. Noah and his nakedness, Gen. 9:20-22.
 - i. Ham's offspring cursed.
 - ii. Enmity between Ham and Shem.

III. GOD PROTECTS HIS FAMILY.

- A. Abraham, Gen. 12.
 - 1. Abram and Sarai struggle to have children.
 - a. God promises they will have a son.
 - b. Yet, Sarah remained barren.
 - 2. At age 85, Sarai gives Hagar to Abram to raise offspring Ishmael born.
 - 3. God allows Sarah (age 90) to have the child promised.
 - a. Ishmael the father of the Arabic nations.
 - b. Isaac continues God's line.
- B. Isaac and Rebekah.
 - 1. Struggle to have children 20 years without.
 - 2. God intervenes and selects younger over older, Gen. 25:23.
 - 3. Esau sells his birth right and Jacob steals his blessing.
- C. Jacob.
 - 1. Rachel the favorite of Jacob barren.
 - a. Joseph born was the favorite child.
 - b. God uses Joseph, not to produce offspring, but to protect the offspring.
 - c. The "seed" to crush the serpent's head not through Rachel or Joseph.
 - 2. But God uses Leah to pass the seed along.
 - a. Trickery used in marriage to Jacob.
 - b. Through her fourth son [Judah] the Messiah would come.
 - i. And that through a "shrine prostitute".
 - ii. Tamar gave birth to twins: Perez and Zerah.
 - 3. Matthew 1:3, the Messiah through Perez.

CLOSING

- A. We are now God's family.
 - 1. We are His sons and daughters.
 - 2. He is our Father.
- B. But the "Family Feud" continues.
 - 1. The family of righteousness and obedience.
 - 2. The family of unrighteousness and rebellion.
- C. God is still protecting His family.
 - 1. The Lord calls us out.
 - a. Galatians 1:4
 - b. Romans 12:2
 - c. 2 Cor. 6:17-18
